Persons running for any elected office must meet all seven of the following criteria: for president-elect, must meet all eight.

- Must be a member in good standing with the national organization. Three years active membership and service to NABSE;
- 2. Life or Subscribing Life Membership status;
- Attended a minimum of three of the last five National Conferences;
- 4. Must hold membership in local or state Affiliate and/or Commission;
- 5. Should have shown other leadership experience;
- 6. Persons running for the office of President-elect must possess at least one degree in education.
- 7. The candidate must be present at the time of nomination.

Distinguished Educators & Members of NABSE,

During my time with the NAACP and now in my role as Chief of Research for Concentric Educational Solutions, I've witnessed a disturbing and unacceptable reality: Black and brown students are chronically absent at rates that far exceed their white peers, often two to three times higher. This glaring disparity is nothing short of an educational injustice that is robbing generations of their potential. It is an *urgent* crisis that we have the unique opportunity to address head-on during the immediate summer months when students are not in school.



Over the coming weeks I'll be engaging with NABSE chapters from across the country to fearlessly explore the entrenched, systemic root causes perpetuating these troubling trends, from the lack of culturally responsive learning environments to the expectation gap that disproportionately ensnares students of color. Together, we must have the courage to confront uncomfortable truths and leverage bold, transformative solutions that dismantle barriers and empower every student to succeed, no matter their race or zip code.

I would welcome the opportunity to connect with additional NABSE districts and leaders to include as many voices in this critical conversation as possible. Please let me know if you have a few minutes to connect; I've included our front page article from last week's USA Today, "Explaining Chronic Absenteeism in U.S. Schools" that shares more about our impact engaging students and families.
